
 Apple, banana, blueberries, Cheerios, rice cake, peanut butter (or equivalent)

Parental Involvement: Medium

Pollinator? Polli-neighbor!

Parental Involvement: Medium to High

A **pollinator** is an animal that moves pollen from one part of a plant to another, or from one plant to another. Some plants need animal pollinators to make fruits or seeds, like raspberries. **Butterflies** and **bees** are perfect pollinators that can be found in your backyard!




Pollinator Paper Roll



- 1. On a piece of paper, design the outline of your pollinator's wings and antennae.
- 2. Decorate the wings, antennae, and paper roll with marker, crayon, pencil or paint.
- 3. Cut out wings and antennae.
- 4. Glue, tape, or staple your wings and antennae to the paper roll.
- 5.Add final touches, then share your craft with a pal!



Host a meal for your backyard birds! Many local birds, like **dark-eyed juncos**, **mourning doves**, and **house sparrows**, like to eat seeds and grains. Because they live near humans in cities and towns, they have discovered that (plain) cereal is a tasty treat. You may even see a **squirrel** snacking on cereal, too!



- 1. Cut string into different size pieces.
- 2. String your Cheerios. Keep an eye on the ends of each string so your cereal does not fall off.
- 3.Get creative! Tie or loop your cereal strings together however you would like.
- 4. Hang your bird feeder, and grab a snack of your own to enjoy with your backyard pals!



Local Eats: Owl Rice Cakes

Parental Involvement: Medium



Barn owls, **great horned owls**, and **western screech owls** all call Los Angeles home! They keep our city healthy by controlling the pest population. One barn owl can eat 3,000 rodents (like mice, rats, and gophers) each year. Thanks, owls!

> While we do not snack on the same food as our owl pals, we can have an owl-inspired snack!

- 1. Spread peanut butter or your spread of choice over a rice cake.
- 2. With an adult's help, slice a banana & apple to make the eyes, beak, & wings.
- 3. Use your fruit and Cheerios to make the body and face of your owl.
- 4. Enjoy your snack!



Pet Pals

Parental Involvement: Low

One animal you may notice in your backyard is a **pet**! A pet is an animal that people keep as a companion. **Dogs** and **cats** are the most popular pets, but there are lots of animals that make good pets. How can you tell if your pal is a pet or is a wild animal? Ask yourself these questions:

- 1. What does this animal eat? Is it easy to get?
- 2. How fast does it grow up?
- 3. Is it calm around people?
- 4. Does it try to run away or escape?
- 5. What kind of family unit does it live in?
