LA ZOO PAID STUDENT INTERNSHIP PROGRAM STUDENT PROFESSIONAL WORKER (Peer Mentor for Learning & Engagement)

SALARY \$18.78 per hour

(The current salary range is subject to change. You may confirm the starting salary with the hiring department before accepting a job offer.)

SCHEDULE This paid internship program is tentatively scheduled to run June 17 – August 9, 2024, 25 hours per week. Mandatory orientation is scheduled for June 17th, 18th, and 20th. Specific shift days and hours may vary but must be available Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays throughout the 2024 internship program.

LOCATION Los Angeles Zoo – 5333 Zoo Drive, Los Angeles, CA 90027
Locations may also include Griffith Park or other City Department locations.

DUTIES / JOB DESCRIPTION

The candidate should be familiar with the Learning & Engagement (L&E) Division's mission, fostering lasting relationships between our communities, nature, and animals. They should feel comfortable facilitating conversations and delivering informal programming for general Zoo visitors.

The L&E Peer Mentor will work with Zoo staff to design and implement on-grounds summer engagement opportunities. Additionally, Peer Mentors will support the first-year interns in developing public communication skills, project completion, foster a sense of belonging, and assist on-grounds as needed.

This internship will provide opportunities to:

- Build on previous work or volunteer experience including:
 - Gain more career experience in zoo and/or environmental education fields; and
 - Strengthen public communication skills while engaging with the public in dialogue about habitats, wildlife, conservation, and animal welfare.
- Enhance skills in interpersonal communication skills, and develop skills in leadership and mentoring; and
- Gain experience working with diverse audiences.

Position Expectations:

- Serve as a liaison for intern feedback to instructor by acting as an advocate for the interests and needs of first-year interns;
- Meet regularly with staff mentors to prepare for each week's instructional materials;
- Ensure interns have the resources they need to complete their projects;
- Travel over uneven terrain up to 4 miles per day, sometimes transporting up to 15 pounds of supplies; and
- Work outside and in varied weather conditions.



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ELIGIBILITY

- Previous experience in a similar internship program or work environment where the candidate engaged the public in environmental education concepts and/or techniques;
- Must be at least 18 years of age;
- Reside within the City of Los Angeles boundaries;
- Completion of the sophomore year by June 3, 2024, and continuing work toward a degree from a recognized four-year college or university; and

ABOUT THE ZOO

The Los Angeles Zoo property comprises 133 acres and is home to more than 2,200 mammals, birds, amphibians and reptiles representing more than 270 different species, 58 of which are endangered. In addition, the Zoo's botanical collection includes several planted gardens, over 800 different plant species and more than 7,000 individual plants.

The Zoo is owned and operated by the City of Los Angeles. The Zoo is operated and staffed by City employees as well as employees from its non-profit fundraising organization and concessionaire sub-contractor. In total, they represent approximately 350 full and part-time Zoo/City employees, and approximately 100 Zoo/City volunteers. The Zoo is open 363 days each year (closed Thanksgiving and Christmas days) and the annual attendance for the Zoo is approximately 1.5 million visitors.

On average, the Los Angeles Zoo and Botanical Gardens has almost 5,000 visitors a day with capacity days up to 10,000 or more visitors. The majority of our visitors are diverse families with young children. Throughout the year over 100,000 school group attendees also come to the Zoo.

The Zoo is a multi-faceted and unique work environment. The dynamic nature of Zoo operations requires flexible and motivated administrative staff who can work to address a multitude of issues. The ideal candidate for this position will be a versatile individual with interest and skills in business operations and administration, project management, and capital programming.
