Once your students and lunches are unloaded your bus may move to the far north area of the parking lot. Buses are not permitted to loiter in the drop-off area.

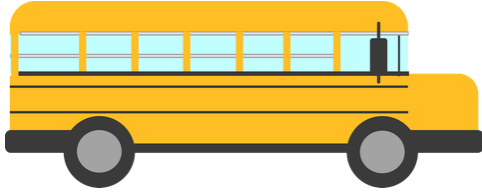
By entering the Los Angeles Zoo, you agree to follow all applicable laws and Zoo rules.

Before Your Visit

Please make sure the date, time, and program choice reserved are listed correctly on your confirmation letter. If any of the information is incorrect, contact the Zoo Reservations Office immediately.

Arrival

- The entire group must enter together to be included in the group count.
- Late arrivals will be charged the regular price.

Payment

- Payment must be presented on the day of your visit.
- The following forms of payment are acceptable:
 - School check with photo I.D. and payable to the Dept. of the Zoo
 - No personal checks are accepted.
 - Cash
 - Credit Card (MC, Visa, Discover, or American Express)
 - Purchase order
 - Purchase orders must be signed to be valid by the school/district accounting office)
- A government issued photo ID is required for checks and credit cards.
- If a group leader is using a school credit card (cardholder not present), a letter of authorization along with a copy of the cardholder's ID is required.



Chaperones & Additional Guests

- Any parent/teacher chaperones exceeding the 1:1 chaperone to student ratio must pay the regular admission rate (\$27.00) or use a Zoo Membership to enter the Zoo.
- Parent chaperones that bring children who are not part of the class, must pay the regular admission rate for each child (children ages 2-12 are \$22 and children under 2 are free) or use a valid Zoo membership that includes each child.

L.A. Zoo Members

- Chaperones who will be using L.A. Zoo Memberships must enter through the member entrance at the main gate.

Changes to Reservation

- If you have changes in your reservation count, you must contact the Reservations Office no later than 72 hours prior to your visit to check if space is available to increase the number of people on your reservation.

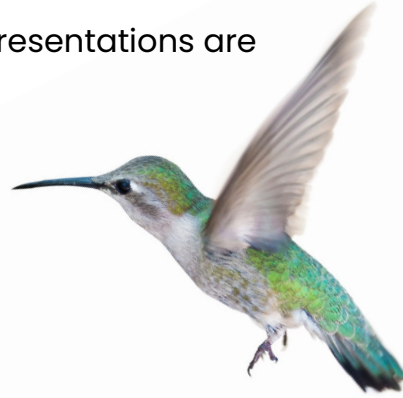

Day of Your Visit



Before You Arrive

- Plan to arrive 20 minutes prior to your scheduled entrance time. We are not able to accommodate earlier arrivals.
 - The check-in process will take approximately 15–20 minutes per bus load.
- Groups will check in at the school group entrance in the Children's Discovery Center (double glass doors to the right of the main entrance).
- Please have total fees collected and an accurate count of students and chaperones **before** you reach the Zoo's school group check-in area.

Checking In

- To expedite the admission process, please have the accurate count of students and chaperones, and have your payment ready prior to going to the check-in window.
- Students and chaperones must remain on the bus until met by one of our Zoo Guest Services staff. Please do not unload the bus before receiving instructions from the Guest Services staff.
 - This procedure is necessary for everyone's safety.
- Once the contact teacher returns to the group with the admission tickets for the group, a Guest Services staff person will direct the group off the bus and to the entrance.
- Guests with digital tickets must enter through the main entrance.

Lunch

- There are no lunch storage facilities.
- Please have a lunch plan ready before you arrive.
- We recommend that your students carry their lunches with them.
- We have various picnic sites inside the Zoo.

Special Needs & Accessibility

The Los Angeles Zoo welcomes all guests. We are happy to help make your visit to the Los Angeles Zoo a safe, memorable, and enjoyable one. The following information is provided to assist you in planning your visit.

- **Service animals** are allowed in many parts of the Zoo. Any guest with a service animal must check in with a Guest Services representative prior to entry. 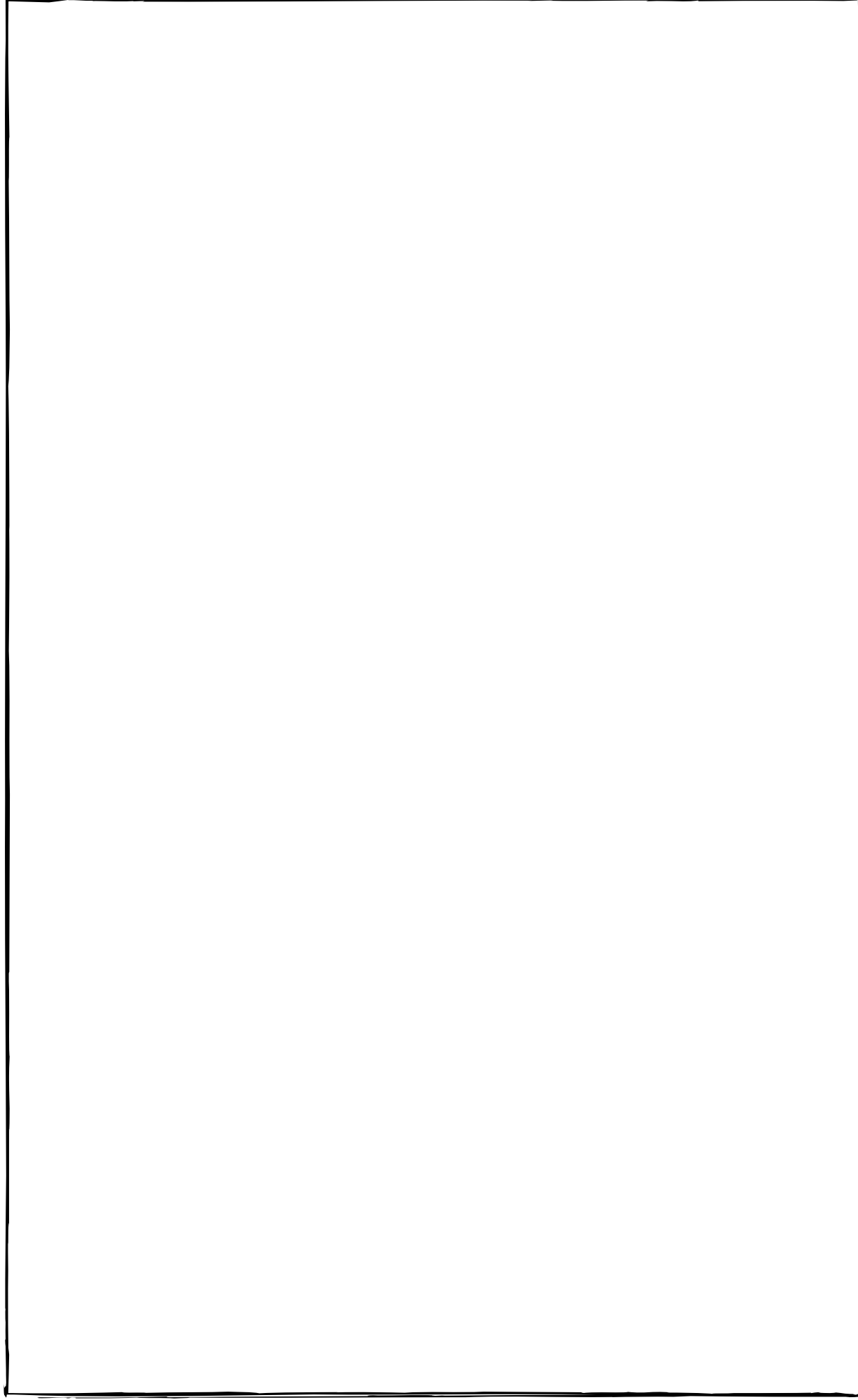

- *There is no wrong way to write a poem.*
- *Your observations are just to give you ideas — feel free to follow them, or go on your own adventure.*
- *A poem can rhyme, but it doesn't have to.*
- *The best poems show us the world so it's like we are seeing it ourselves, and then tell us something unexpected about what it's like to live there.*
- *Write as many lines as feels right! If you want a challenge, try for 5–20 lines. Poetry is about saying big things with just a few words. Or keep it small – short poems can be powerful too!*

Pick an animal that you saw at the L.A. Zoo and draw its habitat.



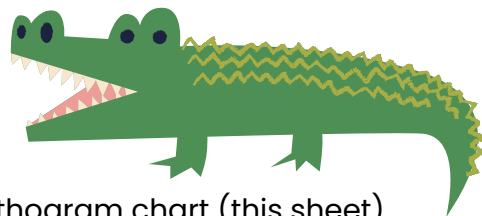

What is an Ethogram?

An ethogram is a tool often used by scientists when they are studying animal behavior. Ethograms list all of the behaviors that a scientist might notice when observing their focus animal.

Researchers at the L.A. Zoo use ethograms to help us better understand the animals at the zoo and in the wild.

Materials:

Timer, Pencil, & Ethogram chart (this sheet)

Activity:

In this activity, you will be a research scientist observing an animal at the L.A. Zoo.

1. Select one animal to observe. This will be your focus animal.
2. Observe your focus animal and every 30 seconds, mark the behavior you notice on the Ethogram.

Behavior Key

Feeding:

The animal is eating, foraging for food, or drinking water.

Resting:

The animal is sitting, lying down, sleeping, or relaxing.

Moving:

The animal is walking or running.

Not Visible:

The animal you are observing is off screen or not visible.

Other:

The animal is doing something different than the behaviors listed.
